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
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### 2020 LAKE CUMBERLAND DISTRICT COMMUNITY HEALTH ASSESSMENT

The primary goal of the 2019 Lake Cumberland District Health Department Community Health Assessment booklet is to provide a valid and reliable data regarding the health of Adair, Casey, Clinton, Cumberland, Green, McCreary, Pulaski, Russell, Taylor and Wayne counties. The Lake Cumberland District Health Department is required to continually assess the health of the population across the Lake Cumberland Area to be compliant with the Public Health Accreditation Board (PHAB).

The Health Policy and Promotion branch facilitated the strategic collaborative process utilizing the Mobilizing for Action through Planning and Partnership (MAPP) toolkit, to complete the 2019 Lake Cumberland District Community Health Assessment. The MAPP process uses a systematic approach to data collection, analysis and dissemination of data, as well as discussion of community assets and resources. This assessment is a valuable tool for community partners and stakeholders to bring awareness to community issues and make well informed decisions regarding public health policies, processes, and interventions.

# **DEMOGRAPHICS**



## **GEOGRAPHY**

The Lake Cumberland District Health Development District (LCDHD) is located in the Lake Cumberland Area Development District (LCADD), in south-central Kentucky. The area is comprised of ten counties: Adair, Casey, Clinton, Cumberland, Green, McCreary, Pulaski, Russell, Taylor and Wayne.

The LCDHD area covers approximately 3,719 square miles. Across the ten counties, there are ten public school districts and three independent school districts. All ten counties are identified as rural and nine of our counties are part of the Appalachian Region. Taylor County is not part of the Appalachian Region. The Appalachian Region is noted for being at an economic disadvantage and poor health outcomes.




# **GENDER AND RACE**

### RACIAL AND ETHNIC CHARATER

In the United States, the estimated population is 76.3% White, 13.4% Black/African American, 18.5% Hispanic/Latino and 5.9% Asian. In Kentucky the population race is 87.5% White, 8.5% Black/African American, 3.9% Hispanic/Latino and 1.6% Asian. The population race across the Lake Cumberland District is 95.1% White, 2.48% Black/African American and 2.7% Hispanic/Latino.









### **HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION RATES**


Graduation rates in Kentucky and the Lake Cumberland District are higher than the national average. Taylor County has the highest graduation rates in our area, while Green County is the lowest.



Median income is the amount which divides the income distribution into two equal groups, half having income above that amount, and half having income below that amount.

Per capita income (PCI) or average income measures the average income earned per person in a given area (city, region, country, etc.) in a specified year. It is calculated by dividing the area's total income by its total population.





# HOUSEHOLD

In 2015-2019, there were 120.8 million households in the United States, 1.7 million households in Kentucky and 80,453 households in the Lake Cumberland District (LCD). The average household size in the United States was 2.60 people, in Kentucky it was 2.49 people and across Lake Cumberland District it was 2.52 people.

Married-couple households made up 48.2% of the households in the United States; 48.3% in Kentucky and approximately 49.9% in the LCD. Approximately 25% of children in the United States and Kentucky lives in single-parent homes. In the Lake Cumberland District 31% of children in Cumberland County children live in single parent homes.

In the United States 34.1% of grandparents are responsible for their grandchildren's basic needs. Kentucky's rates are higher with 52.1%. Across the Lake Cumberland District these percentages are very high. McCreary County is the highest at 90.9% and Wayne County is the lowest at 45.2%.

# **LIVING WAGE**

The living wage shown is the hourly rate that an individual in a household must earn to support his or herself and their family. The assumption is the sole provider is working full-time (2080 hours per year). The table below provides information for individuals, and households with one or two working adults and zero to three children.

The state minimum wage is the same for all individuals. The state minimum wages are determined based on the posted value of the minimum wage as of January one of the coming year (National Conference of State Legislatures, 2019). The poverty rate reflects a person's gross annual income. We have converted it to an hourly wage for the sake of comparison.

# **POVERTY**

In 2020, the United States Department of Health and Human Services, Federal Poverty Guidelines for a family of four is \$27,750. The poverty guidelines measure the family's annual gross income. The Federal Poverty Guidelines were originally developed in the 1960's based on the amount of money spent by a family on food. Over the past 50 years food expenses have increased, as well as childcare, transportation and health care costs.

Poverty rates in the United States are all lower than Kentucky and the Lake Cumberland District. The table below breaks down the poverty data for the Lake Cumberland District.

# **FOSTER CARE**

Across the United States, Kentucky and the Lake Cumberland District children entering foster care is rising dramatically. According to US Department for Health and Human Services, Children's Bureau in November 2021, there are approximately 424,000 youth in foster care. In 2021, Kentucky had approximately 53,868 youth in foster care (KY KIDS County, 2021). 
# **COMPUTER AND INTERNET SUBSCRIPTIONS**

# **HEALTHCARE**



### **HEALTHCARE PROVIDERS**

A Health Professional Shortage Area (HPSA) is a geographic area, population or facility with a shortage of primary care, dental or mental health providers and services. The Health Resource and Services Administration (HRSA) and State Primary Care Offices (PCOs) work together using public, private and state-provided data to determine when such a shortage qualifies for designation as a HPSA.

### Health Professional Shortage Areas (HPSA): Primary Care

According to 2019 HPSA designations, primary care shortages are found in all but seven counties in Kentucky (Health Resources & Services Administration, 2020). In fact, 94% of counties have a primary care shortage. All counties in the Lake Cumberland District are designated as having a shortage of primary care physicians with the exception of Pulaski County where part of the county is designated with a shortage of primary care physicians.

### **Health Professional Shortage Areas: Dental Care**

According to 2019 HPSA designations, dental care shortages are found in all but 40 counties in Kentucky (67% of the counties have a dental care shortage) (Health Resources & Services Administration, 2020). In the Lake Cumberland District six counties are designated as having a shortage of dentist, while three counties have no shortage of dentist.








## **OBESITY**

# BODY MASS INDEX BMI | The state of the stat




# PHYSICAL INACTIVITY

Regular physical activity is a vital element of a healthy lifestyle. The Center for Disease Control and Prevention recommends adults to have at least 150 minutes a week of moderate-intensity aerobic activity and at least two days of muscle-strengthening activity. Regular physical activity will decrease one risk from carovascular disease, hypertension and type 2 diabetes.

Physical inactivity is a term used to identify people who do not get the recommended level of regular physical activity. Kentucky percentage of adults who are physically inactive had no change in the last two years. In the Lake Cumberland District eight counties' percentages are higher than Kentucky.
